








Founded with the mission of promoting independence and dignity, the association offers a variety of programs that help learners develop essential life skills, academic abilities, and vocational competencies. During the visit, trainees observed various training units, such as candle making, paper crafts, massage therapy, and computer education, aimed at increasing self-reliance and creating employment opportunities. The academic sections, which included Braille literacy, mobility training, and assistive device use, demonstrated the institution's commitment to providing accessible and inclusive education. Trainees also learned about the use of modern assistive technologies, such as screen readers, low-vision aids, digital learning tools, and tactile diagrams, which significantly enhance learning outcomes for students with visual impairments. Staff members explained the importance of individual guidance, personalized instruction, and activity-based learning to meet diverse needs. The association also promotes social integration through cultural programs, sports, and skills exhibitions that help build confidence and public awareness. Overall, the visit emphasized key themes beyond vision, such as empowerment, inclusion through accessibility, and skills for economic independence. This experience helped trainees understand the practical application of special education principles, witness the real-life challenges faced by people with visual impairments, and appreciate the effective role of institutions like the Blind Relief Association in creating an inclusive, equitable, and supportive society.

The trainee visit to **JPM School for the Blind** offered a meaningful learning experience by showcasing the school's structured approach to educating and empowering children with visual impairment. Established with the aim of providing quality education, the school integrates academic learning with skill development, ensuring that every child receives equal opportunities to grow. During the visit, trainees observed well-organized classrooms where Braille literacy, tactile learning materials, and activity-based teaching methods were effectively used. Teachers demonstrated the use of assistive devices such as Braille slates, Taylor frames, abacus, tactile diagrams, and screen-reading software, helping students understand both academic and functional concepts. The Orientation and Mobility training unit highlighted how students are taught cane techniques, spatial awareness, and safe independent movement. Trainees also visited the vocational section, where students were engaged in creative activities such as craftwork, music, and computer training, all aimed at enhancing confidence and preparing them for future livelihoods. The school places strong emphasis on inclusive values, providing a barrier-free environment



and individualized instruction tailored to each learner's needs. Interaction with teachers and students helped trainees understand the importance of patience, multisensory teaching strategies, and emotional support in special education. Co-curricular activities, including sports and cultural programs, demonstrated the school's commitment to holistic development. Overall, the visit to JPM School for the Blind enriched the trainees' understanding of special education practices, highlighted challenges faced by visually impaired learners, and reflected the school's dedication to fostering independence, dignity, and meaningful participation in society.
